





The first question is about like when did you come to Canada and where are you currently staying?

I came to Canada in 2015 as an international student from France. After I came to Canada, my university needed to do an internship in France and I returned to France. Then I applied for postgraduate and returned to Canada in 2016 to continue my postgraduate studies.

Do you think like French is important for new Chinese immigrant group for their career development or their personal development in Canada?

The first point is to learn French not only as a language, but more importantly, how much you accept this cultural understanding of the bilingual country in Canada as an English-French bilingual country, and how much Chinese people think of it in this cultural background, it is more of a question of cultural recognition.

I think that means that career development is very important because it depends on your field. If they have a certain reputation in the field, such as researchers and they have a certain reputation in the field. They mainly do scientific research in English, and thus they have less contact with them, so the impact on them is relatively small. As for other things, for example, if you are a doctor, your working language must be French, so if you don't know French, you cannot enter this profession.

Generally speaking like what are your current thoughts on the development of French in Canada and in your region? or other region, yeah?

In Quebec as a whole, various policies, universities and various social organizations are encouraging French, but the reason why it encourages French is actually because French is inevitably regressing. The whole of Canada means Canada as a whole. Because I haven't been in contact with Canada as a whole, I think the French in the northern part of Ontario is in the northern part of Quebec and in the northern part of NB province. French has a certain viability, because it is French community and many of these mining companies are French, as well as this kind of aboriginal people, are all French-speaking, or is it a must. Of course, if I say the whole thing, I don't think it's very clear. I think there are still very big challenges, because French is not a particularly easy language to learn.

How do you think how do you think the current context, like Quebec, the environment, influenced your language, attitudes towards French? Like how do you think like a social context?

First of all, let me talk, I can subdivide Quebec into MRC. Each MRC is an administrative region, which means that in addition to the Montreal area, there are some areas in Quebec, and most of them speak French. Because it has a population of 8 million and a population of 5 million in the countryside, things are in small towns, 95% of the population in small towns speak French, so you, you, in this kind of community, it has an inertia, you don't speak French, you know what I mean? so this kind of development is stable because this society has not come into contact with many foreigners, so its development is relatively stable. There are not many changes, means that if you want to enter this area, you need to adapt to it, then for Montreal is an international city. It may be more often used in tourism, business, and finance. English is actually relatively strong.

There is a slight negative effect, let me explain why. Because I want to start a business, that is to say, if I start a business, one of the problems facing the future is to recruit workers. It is very difficult for him to recruit workers, such as manufacturing, and you force someone to speak French, and workers cannot be recruited. You know what I mean? After recruiting workers, you are responsible, and you have to teach them French, or it will be relatively difficult. So from this, this policy feels..., that is to say, it has a certain bad and relatively bad influence.

the next question is like how do you think like French language course influence your language attitude like?

This is a good question. First of all, I want to talk more about the mode of taking a class.. The way Chinese people are used to is to learn pronunciation in China and the first one is to speak in Chinese, which is easier to accept. The second Chinese learns

French or English by memorizing words and grammar. For example, if you are a Chinese, he came to Quebec or came to Canada and France. He directly learns French from French communication. But for Chinese people, the chinese language is different from Latin language, pattern is totally different, which really impede the development of French learning.

It means.. Chinese people pay more attention to this kind of rules. For example, the language that the Chinese learn is very regular, like grammar. Therefore, if you go directly to the dialogue here, the difference is too big. They may say that this kind of thing and this kind of change are too various. French course influence is not particularly obvious because when I learn French, I just follow Chinese.

The second is a very complicated conjugation of verbs. It means that when you learn this course, verbs, because you, for example, you are here in Quebec. What you learn is a dialogue, you are not know how to write verbs, so he teaches this way. The model has a certain counter-effect for this non-Latin students to learn French, which means that his quality of words in writing and writing will be very poor. Not very comfortable about this kind of strategy. This kind of interaction cause bad effects.

Language is the more the better. Of course, the better you speak French, the more smoothly you can communicate with them, and you will feel that this is a positive correlation.
